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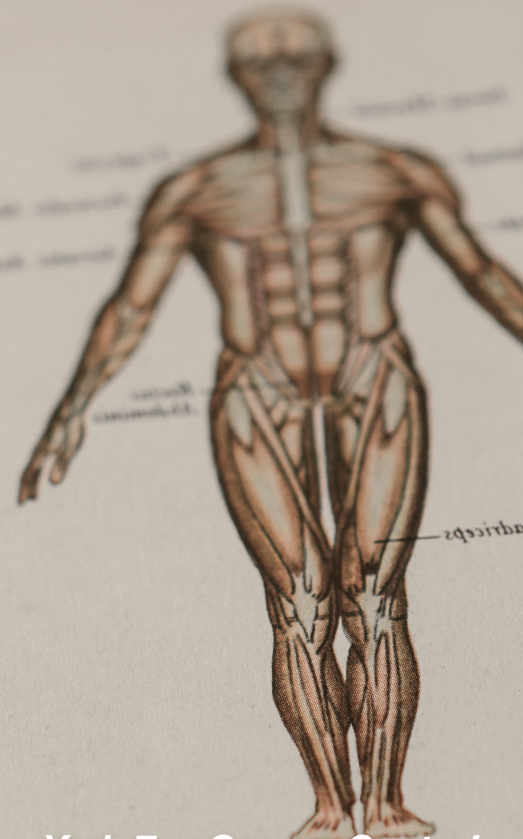

## REPORTING OUTCOMES

Doctors usually refer to specialists they know, if they saw the doctor give a presentation or if your insurance is accepted. Patients, however want the best doctor. A specialist who will deliver the highest possible chance of saving their life and their sight.

At *The New York Eye Cancer Center*, we have a long history of publishing our results in medical and scientific journals. However, we recognized that patients rarely have access to medical literature. Therefore, starting in 2017, we were the first to publish our treatment results on the internet for all patients to see.

See 3 common types of eye cancer seen at our center, choroidal melanoma, iris-ciliary-body melanoma, and squamous-conjunctival melanoma. With time we will do more.

We show the results of every patient who comes back to the waiting room. These are average results of hundreds of patients used as a reference for our practice.
Knowing Dr. Finger's results, you can have a more accurate point of reference for your own prognosis, rather than a quick google search that may or may not be applicable to you and your specific diagnosis.	Because of the rarity of eye cancer, visible results are limited only to three types of eye cancer. However, if you have an uncommon tumor, See Dr. Finger, he will assess you based on his 32 year history treating all eye cancers.
